The story of the "little landscaping company that grew", isn't so unique. What makes this story different is that, from the top down, the entire enterprise is run by psychiatric survivors.....Until the last decade, this was a community that in many sectors, was largely thought to be unemployable. Many post-hospital "consumer-survivors" languished on family benefits, losing jobs, homes and self respect along the way. It's a situation that spirals into something mental health activists have called the "poverty of the soul". That is, until the Ontario Council of Alternative Businesses (OCAB) was formed in 1993 as an umbrella organization to oversee the development and sustainability of several consumer-survivors run enterprises that include The Raging Spoon and Out of This World cafes....It's incredible to see the change in mindset that occurs in workers.

Green Thumb employees made presentations to funders from United Way, the City of Toronto, ODSP Employment Supports and HRDC about their business and the impact it had had on their lives.
